

CAREER ADVISING FRAMEWORK GRADES PreK-12

The Trotwood Madison City School District's plan for providing career advising includes, providing:

- Grade level examples that link student's school work to one or more career fields by implementing the Career Connections Learning Strategies offered by the Ohio department of Education.
- Career advising to students in grades PreK-12, which includes age appropriate activities and also
 includes creating and maintaining a Career Readiness Plan beginning in grade 6, which includes
 meeting with each student at least once annually to explore, evaluate and plan academic and
 career pathways.
- 3. Additional interventions and career advising for students who are identified as at risk of dropping out of school. These include:
 - Identifying students who are at risk of dropping out of school using a local, research based method with input from teachers, school counselors and other appropriate school staff.
 - b. Developing an Individualized Student Success Plan for each at risk student that reviews and assesses the student's academic and career pathway to successful graduation, the role of career-technical education, competency based education and experiential learning where appropriate and which addresses the student's individual challenges in successfully completing the pathway to graduation.
 - i. District staff will invite the student's parent, guardian, or custodian to assist in the development of the Individualized Student Success Plan. If that adult does not participate in the plan development, the district will provide the adult a copy of the plan, a statement of the importance of a high school diploma and a listing of the pathways to graduation available to the student.
- 4. Training for employees on how to advise students on career pathways, including use of the tools available in OhioMeansJobsK-12 and other online sources provided by the district.
- 5. Multiple academic and career pathways through high school that students may choose to earn a high school diploma, including opportunities to earn industry-recognized credentials and postsecondary course credit through College Credit Plus.
- 6. Information on courses that can award students both traditional academic and career-technical credit including but not limited to the District's policy on credit flexibility and instructions for students to access the educational option.
- 7. Documentation on career advising provided for review by the student's parent, guardian, or custodian, and schools the student may attend in the future. This includes activities that support

- the student's academic, career and social/emotional development such as those saved to a student's OhioMeans JobsK-12 Backpack.
- 8. The supports necessary for students to successfully transition from high school to their postsecondary destinations, including interventions and services for students in need of remediation in mathematics and English Language arts.

This policy on career advising will be reviewed biannually and made available to students, parents, guardians and custodians, local postsecondary institutions and district residents via the Trotwood Madison City School's District website.
